# **GREEN UP AFTER YOURSELF**



Is your state agency having an upcoming event? Spring time is upon us and many agencies will be hosting luncheons, bake sales, family picnics and other opportunities that produce waste. Why not recycle it?

DCS can provide you with portable recycle containers for your next function.

These "green machines" stand about 4 feet high and bags are provided. After your event is over, all that is needed is to take the bags to the nearest recycle center. If DCS currently picks up recycling at your building, then simply add the bags to it and you're all done! If your event is outdoors and wind might be an issue, sand bags can be provided to prevent tipping.

The Department of Mental Health and the Department of Environmental Quality utilized these containers at a recent picnic. Dianne Wilkins from DEQ stated "DCS provided recycling receptacles and signs. From this event ,we collected 45 lb. of commingled plastic and aluminum".

Many times, simply providing a convenient way to recycle can be all it takes for people to do so. Provide your employees that opportunity...*if you collect it they will come*. with her support of a new law. Equivocal attempts have been made in the past, but this law is different as it has some clearly defined goals.

The overall energy savings goal of this act is 20% by 2020. These savings will be accomplished by gathering information on state facilities, benchmarking from the collected data, and then targeting energy savings in behavior or performance. This information will assist the director of the Office of State Finance to accomplish this mission. The term "facilities" is defined as "buildings or assets owned or operated by a state agency which has a heating, ventilation, or air conditioning system or utility services".

When asked about the impact of the new law, OSF Interim Director Carol McFarland stated "Energy conservation is vital to reducing state government costs and has the potential of saving taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars. This program is an example of how some smart business principles can be applied to government and should be enthusiastically supported by all state agencies. The Office of State Finance will do all it can to meet the program's costcutting goals." Seeing bugs?



## Light'n Up



If you've been around the Capitol Complex lately, you may have spotted these floating about. No, UFOs have not invaded, but a new lighting scheme has. The Energy Management Team is working to lower the cost of lighting by raising the efficiency of the lights. At Hodge, we reduced lighting levels by removing one bulb per fixture and replacing all of the bulbs with more energy efficient models. At Sequoyah and Thorpe, the same number of bulbs are being used, but again, they are the more efficient model. These more efficient models produce the same amount of light as the old models with less wattage.

#### The Take Away

So what does all of this mean to you? First of all, you will have the amount of light you need, no more, no less. Secondly, you can help our team. Help us to continue to lower costs. Turning off unused lights can save more than you realize. If you sit near a window, try simply using the sun light. Join our efforts with your diligence.
